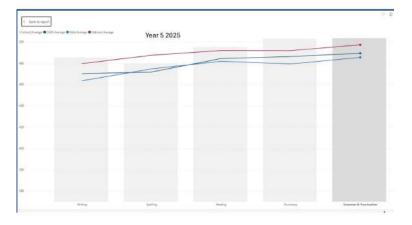
This week our Year 6 Mini Vinnies group lead us in Courtyard Prayer, hinged on the idea that we are all anchored to live collectively under 'God's Beautiful Rainbow'. (Genesis 9:13-17) reminds us that just like the colours of the rainbow, each person brings their unique gifts, and together, we can reflect the beauty of God's creation. God's covenant with Noah reminds us that we are all part of His promise of love, hope, and unity when working at our best.







Last term we received an e-mail congratulating us on the wonderful achievements of our Year 5 students in exceeding expectations in their NAPLAN earlier this year. Since Year 3, this group of students improved 2.1 points above the expected growth in Writing, 4.3 points in Spelling and 9.1 points in Grammar and Punctuation. The data also showed how we had not only exceeded Diocesan and State Means, but the National Average in 4 of the 5 areas assessed as illustrated here.



We were asked to consider what 'hunches' we had around why the growth of this co-hort from Year 3 to 5 was so significant, to assist not only us, but other schools in their quest for student improvement. The Teachers and the Board engaged in the data and observations were explored. However, after listening to the Year 6's Rainbow Prayer, I can't help but think that this significant NAPLAN growth of our Year 5 co-hort is a testament to the dedication and commitment of every stakeholder—teachers, support staff, parents, leadership, DCEO and of course the students themselves. It reflects the collaborative partnership that our community aspires to foster, where everyone is united in their mission to nurture each child's potential. Data is just one piece of information, but important when setting future goals and to help guide the decision making process.

Then, on the last day of Term 4, I had the privilege of accompanying the St. Patrick's Mixed and Girls Wide Bay All Schools Touch Teams to compete for the first time. Captain, Giorgi P. also made mention of the generous sponsorship afforded by Anastasi Blooms and Charltons Lawyers which meant our teams looked as sharp as they played on the day. Schools educating students in the Mercy Tradition are called to not only encourage development of one's own gifts and talents, but to in turn, use these to enkindle growth in others so they 'may have life and have it to the full' (John 10:10). This was highlighted this week as an excellent example of a Mercy Moment.

I couldn't be prouder of our students and what they are achieving with the support of this community, in and out of the classroom. Growth is not as easy to measure, some times even stunted and not always in a straight row. However, seeing students try their best is what we envisage for our students. Turning up everyday is important and we worked hard on reducing absenteeism this year, which I know has also been a group effort! Thanks for being instrumental to what we've been able to achieve this year. I am hoping the next eight weeks prove to be as successful and provide an opportunity for us to continue to work with a shared purpose to continue to 'seek higher things' like shown best this week by the Year Six prayer and 'God's Beautiful Rainbow'.

SOCIAL MEDIA MINIMUM AGE

As we approach **10 December**, when the new <u>Social Media Minimum Age</u> law comes into effect, it's important for families to start preparing for the changes.

If you have children under 16 who currently use age-restricted social media platforms, they will be directly impacted by the new law.

To support your children through this transition, it's helpful to:

- Talk openly about the new age restrictions and why they're being introduced.
- Understand how your child currently uses social media and explore how these changes might affect them.
- Reassure them that these changes are about safety and wellbeing, not punishment.

To help guide these conversations, <u>eSafety</u> has developed practical tips for parents and carers to start these conversations to support you in starting and managing discussions in a calm and constructive way.

Get together with other carers to catch up, make connections and share stories, knowledge and experience.

Facilitated Coaching

One-on-one support with a coach to help you to make positive changes to your own life by setting goals and working on a plan to achieve these goals.

Tailored Support Packages

Practical assistance to ensure you have access to the resources you need when caring for someone, such as items to assist in your caring role and short-term respite.

If something urgent or unforeseen happens that prevents you from being able to be there for the person you support, we can make sure they are looked after. Emergency respite is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

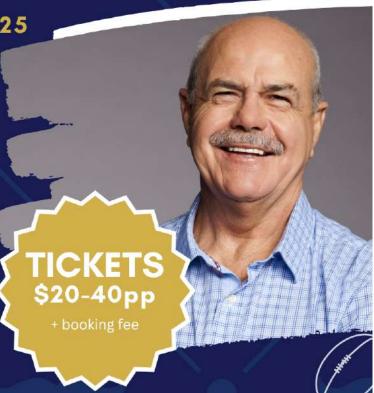




THURSDAY 16 OCT 2025

Leigh Matthews is a highly decorated figure in the AFL, renowned both as a player and coach. Matthews earned the iconic nickname "Lethal Leigh" due to his physical as well as skilful style of play. He is officially recognised as the "best player of the 20th century" according to the AFL, is a 'Legend' in the Australian Football Hall of Fame, named in the Hawthorn and AFL teams of the century, and is one of the most successful AFL coaches of all time, winning three consecutive premierships with the Lions in 2001, 2002 and 2003.

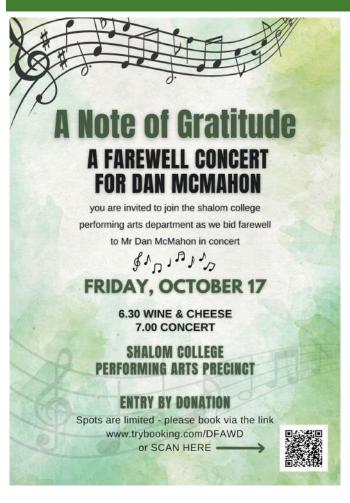












Parent Workshop: Supporting your student with reading
