PRINCIPAL'S NEWS

The following is an extract from an article published in The Age by Chris Summers. He is a former teacher, current lecturer and PhD candidate in Education.

I was the ideal candidate to career-change into teaching in an apprenticeship-style program. I had a combined Arts/Law degree, was admitted as a lawyer and have experience as a professional playwright. Both my parents were teachers, I attended the local public school and I had the desire to continue in their footsteps teaching in low-socioeconomic, challenging environments.

At the end of 2014, I was thrilled and determined to start a career as a drama/legal studies teacher in rural Victoria. After a six-week intensive course contributing to a master's degree in teaching, in January 2015 I began my four-day-a-week teaching load.

I left the profession after four years, two years after completing the program, joining the 30 to 50 per cent of teachers who leave teaching in their first five years. I had assumed once I graduated with my Masters and was able to begin a more "normal" teaching career, things would become easier.

Instead, I now worked five days with a modest pay rise. The demands of crafting and assessing effective curriculum, engaging with parents and school leadership, the expectations around NAPLAN and VCE performance, and the endless administrative tasks that saw lunchtimes disappear and evenings stretch into the late hours only got worse. I lasted another two years before transitioning into education academia, burnt out.

A focus on entry points into the profession detracts from the bigger, more difficult questions ministers seem to have mostly avoided: why aren't teachers staying, and what can we change about the system to fix this?

Pay gets a lot of attention, but few teachers are attracted to the profession— or enticed to remain in it—by pay alone. Teachers are driven by wanting to work with students, parents and communities. Unrealistic teaching loads, limited planning time, constrained curriculum and ongoing data-gathering for often unknown purposes all take teachers further away from what they do best.

These should be the first areas addressed to support those already teaching, before the issue of supply is considered.

This article refers to the extraordinary meeting of Education Ministers recently and I think Chris Summers has given a fairly good personal insight into an all-too-common story in the teaching profession and the issues involved. Our communities need to know these stories and appreciate the issues involved.

We are unbelievably blessed to have retained our staff through some incredibly demanding times. I believe one of the major reasons we have achieved this, is that our staff give, and in turn experience kindness, respect and gratitude from our students and even more importantly from our parents.

I can not name a single staff member who is here for the pay. It really is about accepting the challenge of trying to do good and to make a difference in the lives of our students. We do this best when parents and staff work together and we do this exceptionally well here. Thank you to all those parents who express their appreciation and who work so respectfully with us. It means more than you could know and contributes hugely to our school's culture.

COVID-19 UPDATE

- Seek a PCR or Rapid Antigen test where it is recommended and notify the school of positive results.
- Follow the advice of Queensland Health

As we continue to navigate the pandemic, please remind your child/ren to:

- maintain good hand hygiene at all times
- cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue or the inside of their elbow and dispose of tissues in the bin immediately.
- practice social distancing from others where possible
- wear masks when required

We will continue to work closely with health authorities to keep our school community informed of any developments and advice. Thank you once again for your ongoing support.

FLU AND INFLUENZA ADVICE

As you are aware every year Queensland experiences an influenza or flu season. Qld Health has advised that it has recorded an increase in the number of influenza notifications. Therefore, is timely to remind parents and care-givers not to be complacent about the flu.

Flu is a virus more serious than the common cold and can be spread through talking, coughing and sneezing. Symptoms include sudden fever, dry cough, muscle aches and pains, fatigue, headache, sore throat and a stuffy or runny nose.

If your child has flu-like symptoms, the following is advised:

- Keep your child home from school
- Ensure your child washes their hands regularly with soap and water or sanitiser gel
- Encourage your children when coughing or sneezing, to cover their mouth and nose with disposable tissues which should be disposed of immediately
- Ensure they drink plenty of fluids and get lots of rest
- Consult your doctor if you are concerned about their symptoms.



The school requests that anyone displaying flu-like symptoms stay at home until such symptoms have passed. Families should also reinforce the recommended protective actions listed above. Increased awareness and ongoing attention to prevention and control measures, such as vaccination and good hygiene, are steps that we can all promote to reduce the impact of influenza.
